

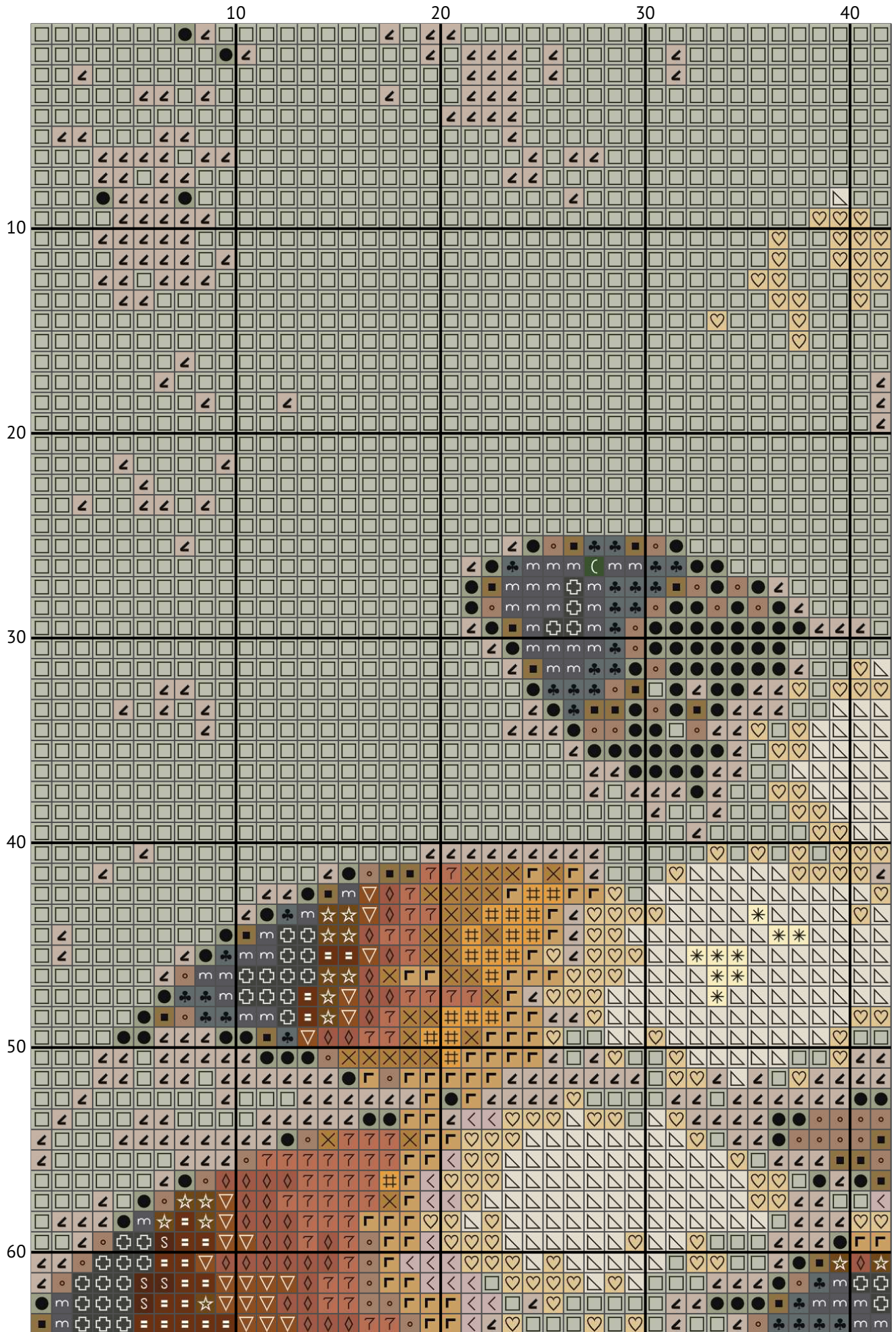
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Cross stitch chart

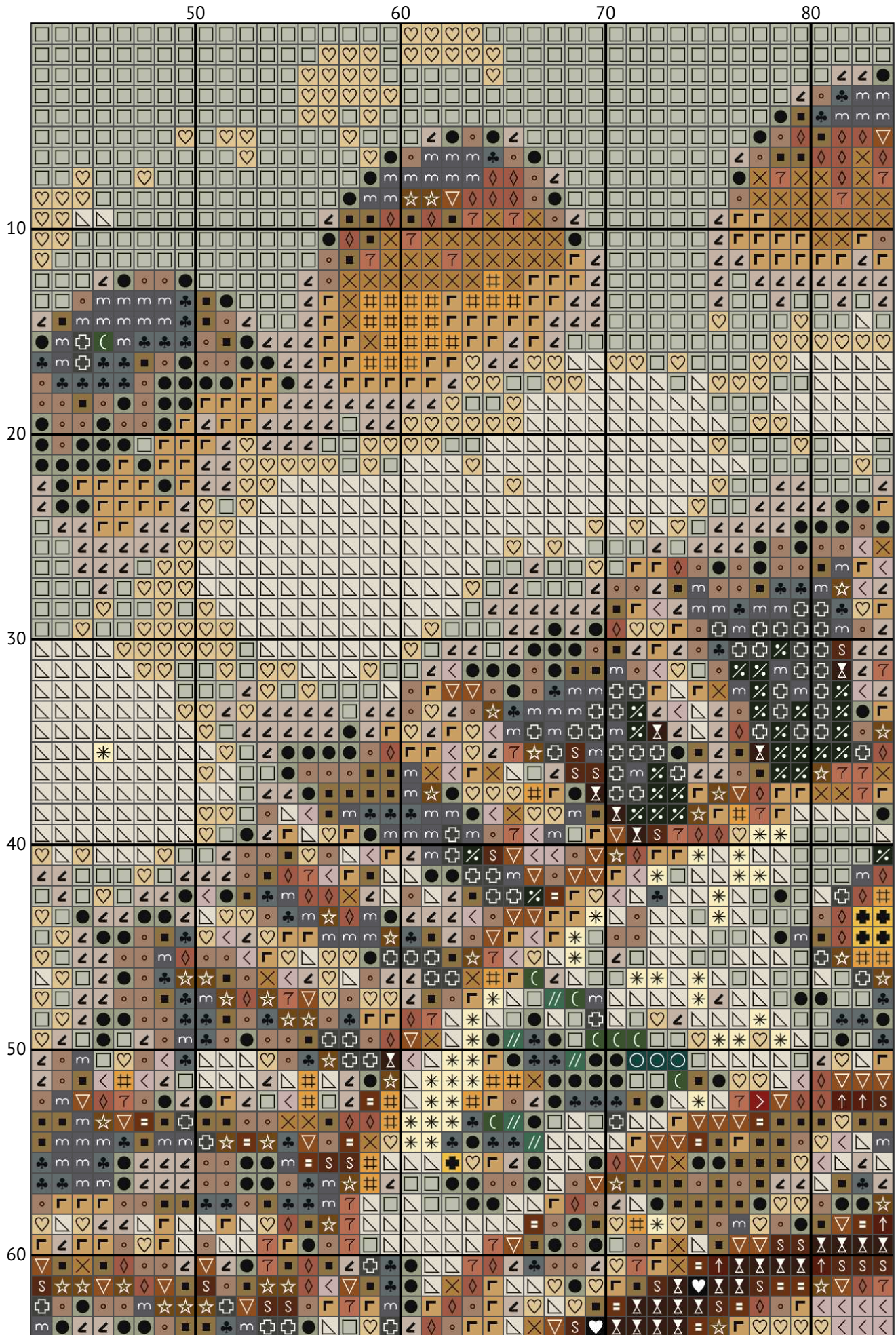

To calculate the dimensions of a cross stitch design in centimeters or inches for a pattern size like "200 x 200 stitches," it's essential to know the fabric's count. The fabric count indicates the number of stitches that fit into one inch (or centimeter).

Here's the method to determine the size:

Identify the Fabric Count: Check the fabric packaging to find this information. Common fabric counts include 11, 14, 16, 18, 22, etc., representing the number of stitches per inch for each count.

Calculate the Size in Inches:

Divide the stitch count by the fabric count.

For instance, with a 200 x 200 stitch pattern on 14-count fabric, the calculation is $200 \text{ stitches} / 14 \text{ stitches per inch} = \text{approximately } 14.29 \text{ inches}$ for each side.

Calculate the Size in Centimeters:

Convert inches to centimeters, knowing there are about 2.54 centimeters in an inch.

For the example given, $14.29 \text{ inches} * 2.54 \text{ cm/inch} = \text{approximately } 36.27 \text{ centimeters}$ on each side.

Keep in mind, the greater the fabric count, the smaller each stitch will be, resulting in a more compact design. On the other hand, a lower fabric count leads to larger stitches and a bigger overall design.

Make sure to include extra fabric margins for framing or finishing your project.
